Water Supply



The Northwest Area Water Supply Project will bring water from Lake Sakakawea to the Minot area and points west. The project will resolve water quality problems, such as arsenic, sodium and adequate supply to many communities. Due to a 2002 lawsuit filed by Manitoba against the United States, pipeline construction from the lake to the city of Minot has been delayed. The judge allowed construction to proceed on projects north of the city of Minot and NAWS has worked on providing an interim water supply and related construction north of Minot. The lawsuit centers on disease transmission and fish migration into Lake Winnipeg. The next phase of the construction will put an intake into the lake and construct a biota treatment plant, control structure and a storage tank. The city of Minot instituted a one-cent sales tax to pay the 35% local share of the project's cost for the entire area.
